

WHO WE ARE

Kids Brain Health Network is a national network that develops and harnesses scientific advances in technologies, interventions and supports with the goal of helping children with neurodevelopmental disabilities and their families live their best lives.

Approximately 10% of Canadian children between the ages of 4 to 11 have a neurodevelopmental disability such as autism spectrum disorder, cerebral palsy and fetal alcohol spectrum disorder. Since 2010, Kids Brain Health Network (KBHN) has brought life-changing science directly to these families.



No other organization in Canada does what KBHN does. We move innovation into practice by working side by side with families, partners, funders and experts.

We identify and support the most promising new research in neurodevelopmental disabilities, evaluate new and effective treatments, and explore better ways to support children and their families.

MIMI'S STORY

When Mimi was diagnosed with autism at the age of two, she could barely communicate. Mimi's mother Jina enrolled her in the Social ABCs, a KBHN-funded program for toddlers showing social communication challenges and those with suspected or diagnosed autism.

Jina started to see changes in Mimi—and in herself—early in the program. Six weeks in, Mimi walked for the first time. Mimi now communicates through sounds, words and short sentences, skills that were nurtured through the Social ABCs program.

"Social ABCs had a huge impact on our entire family, grandparents included, on the way we parent Mimi," says Jina. "For us, Social ABCs was this community of support, with people versed in autism who at the same time truly celebrated Mimi for who she is."

WHAT WE DO

Our focus is in three key areas:

1

EARLY IDENTIFICATION

Children with neurodevelopmental disabilities are often not identified at a young age when interventions are most impactful. KBHN-funded research pushes diagnostic capacity into infancy to identify children with neurodevelopmental disabilities sooner.

EARLY INTERVENTION AND EFFECTIVE TREATMENT

KBHN works at the cutting edge of treatment to ensure all children and families have access to effective interventions and treatments

FAMILY SUPPORT

Research funded by KBHN identifies the most effective strategies to support parents and caregivers to reduce family stress, improve communication and access resources that help their children realize their full potential.
